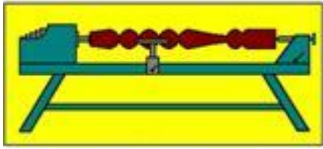

Treasurer's Report

Hello everyone. As reported elsewhere in the newsletter, I have been appointed to the Management Committee as Treasurer to replace Brian Creese.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank Brian for his enthusiasm and diligence in performing this role for the last six years. Brian isn't completely removed from "Treasurer" duties

as he has agreed to undertake the Assistant Treasurer's role until the next Management Committee is appointed later in the year.

As our financial year ended on 31 December 2014, there are two separate reports this month; Brian has prepared a report for the year to 31st December and my report relates to the month of December.

Major income items for December were memberships (\$853), net meeting income (\$1,435) and store sales (\$576). This was offset by store purchases (\$809) and electricity (\$773). Cash balance at the end of the month was \$36,114.

Preliminary Financial Report for 2014

Last year was another successful year for the Society's finances. Total income as \$84,916 and total expenses were \$79,576. We finished the year with total funds of \$36,155, compared with \$30,815 at the start of the year.

Membership

We signed up 38 new members during the year, compared with 37 in the previous year. However, total membership declined slightly from 250 to 245. Income from membership subscriptions and joining fees was \$13,266, compared with \$13,654 in 2013.

Member Events

Net revenue from member events (\$12,685) was about the same as the previous year (\$12,657). The most popular events continued to be the Tuesday morning workshops (\$7,249), Tuesday evening workshop (\$975), Saturday demonstrations (\$591), and Forum meetings (\$923). The Leatherwork classes on Wednesday and Thursday mornings have become even more popular, with net revenue of \$1,439 in 2014 compared with \$692 in 2013. The Jimmy Clewes demo in May was very successful, with net revenue of \$1,144.

Exhibitions

Net revenue of \$5,273 from the two Exhibitions at Mount Coot-tha was down slightly compared with 2013 (\$6,497), with the poor result in August being partially compensated for by the very

successful event in November. The Timber and Working with Wood Show in May and the Open Day in June again returned small profits: \$365 and \$399 respectively, compared with \$94 and \$246 in 2013.

Fundraising

The Bunnings Sausage Sizzle in March raised net revenue of \$1,056, and the major raffle in May successfully raised \$704. Our thanks go to Metabo, who donated the prize for this raffle (compound sliding drop saw). Income from other raffles was \$183.

Other income

Other major income sources in 2014 were sub-leasing fees (\$7077), store income (\$406 net) and soft drink sales (\$664).

Property and equipment

Major building improvements in 2014 were the refurbishment of the Basement Workshop and new shelving in the Library, which cost a total of \$4,483. The electrical fitout in the Basement was funded by a grant of \$2,475 from the Lord Mayor's Suburban Initiative Fund. Building maintenance costs were \$7,171, including \$4,994 for replacement of the roof of the main Workshop.

Major equipment items purchased during 2014 were the Omega Stubby lathe (\$3,000), Vicmarc VL150 lathe (\$1,430), compactus for tool storage in the Basement (\$1,200), Festool 26L vacuum

cleaner (\$975) and one computer (\$579). Total expenditure on equipment was \$8,715, with a further \$2,105 being spent on equipment repairs and maintenance.

Other expenditure

Other major expenditure costs included membership badges (\$565), annual competition (\$840), library purchases (\$1,316), newsletter expenses (\$2,110), insurance (\$4,320), electricity (\$3,011) and cleaning (\$2,627). These costs were generally similar to those in the previous year.

Conclusion

Highlights of the year have included further building improvements and investment in new and replacement equipment. A healthy bank balance remained at the end of the year, and WSQ is well placed for further improvements in facilities and activities in the year ahead. The financial records for 2013 are currently with the auditor, and a complete Financial Statement will be presented at the AGM on 28 March and published in the April newsletter.

I am very grateful to John Reed for offering to take on the job as Treasurer for 2015, and I hope that he finds the job as interesting and rewarding as I have for the last 6 years.

Handy hints for a stress free entry

The online entry form times out after 20 minutes of being idle....which is fine if you have everything ready to go!

If you have everything at hand you will need about 8 – 10 minutes.

Helpful hint: Create a folder on your desktop with the following in it so you can easily locate it to upload.

A copy of the named image file in jpg format. (1 – 4MB labelled with a filename of your name and title of the work).

We are interested in the artwork not the frame so crop the frame out if possible. This also means you don't have to have it framed for the entry deadline and you can frame it in time to deliver the work in May.

A word document with:

- title
- measurements of the work in millimetres (height x width) (+ depth for 3D works)
- the medium
- the price (all work must be for sale)
- artist statement of up to 60 words
- your ABN if you have one

Your credit card to pay your entry fee of \$29.

Avoid the traffic jam...don't leave entering until the last minute!

Dates to keep in mind

- Entries close 4pm Friday February 27
- Successful entrants will be notified in early April
- Delivery of shortlisted selected artworks is on May 6
- Opening night May 16
- Exhibition open to the public May 17 – 24
- Artist Market Day – May 23 (details on how you can participate will be released soon)
- Collection of works - May 25
- Collection of work via courier - May 26

Spalted Wood and Fungal Fences

All woodturners know that spalted wood is a result of fungal activity breaking down the structure of the wood. However, the process of the development of the various colours and patterns in spalted wood has been a bit of a mystery to most of us. An article in a recent issue of New Scientist magazine gave an excellent description of what the patterns of lines and colours actually represent.

To appreciate the description of the process of spaltting, it is necessary to have some understanding what fungal hyphae are, because fungal hyphae are the key players in the spaltting process. Briefly, in a fungus, hyphae are long branching tubular filamentous structures which are the main form of vegetative growth of the fungus. Hyphae may be modified in many different ways to serve specific functions. Some specialised hyphae function as "roots" responsible for absorption of nutrients from within host cells such as dead wood. Spaltting is the result of the spread of hyphae throughout dead wood.

The effects of the spread of hyphae and the development of spaltting are explained in the following extract from the New Scientist.

"Fungi are territorial beasts and recognise their own. If the mycelium of any individual fungus - the mass of interconnected hyphae that form its generally hidden body - splits into smaller networks, these happily grow independently. If they later encounter one another again, they will fuse back together to form a bigger mycelium and so pool resources.

It is another story when genetically different individuals of the same species meet: on touching they will recoil behind the fungal equivalent of a picket fence. Actually, make that barbed wire: the dense, contorted, much branched walls of hyphae that fungi build to mark out their territory are not designed to invite friendly interaction. These impenetrable barriers are the lines, black or autumnal brown and orange, that mark out spalted

wood used to make decorative bowls and jugs."

So next time you look at a piece of spalted wood you will know that a large area of uniform colour is the result of a fungus meeting up with its sisters and its cousins and its aunts, uniting with them and collectively expanding through the wood until strangers are encountered. Smaller areas of different colours mark where fungi with few or no relatives as allies succeeded in establishing only small territories. How effective the various fungi have been within their own territories is indicated by the degree of breakdown of the wood as part of the decay process. Woodturners measure that by how much difficulty they have with variable hardness and extremely soft patches in spalted wood.

January Demonstration

On the morning of Saturday January 24 just over 40 members attended a session which included the handover of a new Vicmarc VL 240 lathe to the Society.

Under the agreement between Vicmarc and WSQ, Vicmarc retains ownership of the lathe and WSQ has exclusive use of the equipment for demonstrations and related purposes for the foreseeable future. Those present expressed their great appreciation of Vicmarc's generosity.

Marco had brought along Vicmarc's Grinding Jig and Station. He discussed this product and answered many questions about it. It generated a great deal of interest from the members in attendance. Marco also spoke about the history of the company, and their products.

After morning tea Rob advised that he would christen the new lathe by making a gavel. The head of the gavel would be made from a New Guinea Rosewood burl, and the handle from a New Guinea Rosewood spindle blank.

Rob mounted the gavel head blank between centres and turned the piece to round. Because it was a piece of burl with grain going in all directions Rob explained that it was important to think carefully about the direction in which the blank was mounted to minimise the possibility catching an edge between heart and sap wood and removing more wood than he had planned to.

Rob marked the planned pattern on the blank, used a parting tool and callipers to set the various depths required, used spindle gouges and a skew chisel to create the overall shape, and turn the beads and coves which formed parts of the design. As usual Rob displayed the skill of a surgeon in his tool use to produce a beautifully shaped object. He stressed the desirability of being able to use chisels with both left and right hands to allow some of the cuts to be executed correctly. After creating a small spigot at the tailstock end of the blank, Rob reverse chucked the blank into a drill chuck in the headstock and carefully shaped the ends of the gavel head. The small spigots remaining were cut off using the band saw.

Rob more or less repeated the process above to turn the gavel handle. He took great care in turning the long spigot section to fit into the hole in the head, carefully reducing its diameter using the rub marks on the spigot as a guide to how much waste to remove. The end result needed to be a firm fit but not too tight, so glue could be catered for.

Rob sanded the two parts of the gavel through the grits so that it was ready to apply the glue and the finish to by the end of the session.

Tree of the Month – Hairy Oak



Allocasuarina inophloia, or Stringybark She-Oak, is a shrub or small tree of the she-oak family Casuarinaceae endemic to inland New South Wales and Queensland. The hairy bark is an unusual feature.

Taxonomy

First collected near Roma in central Queensland, the stringybark she-oak was described by Ferdinand von Mueller and Frederick Manson Bailey in 1882 as *Casuarina inophloia*. Exactly 100 years later, Lawrie Johnson moved it to its current genus *Allocasuarina* in his revision of the she-oaks.

Description

Allocasuarina inophloia grows as a small tree with an open habit ranging from 3 to 10 m high. It is dioecious. Like all she-oaks, its foliage is composed of segmented branchlets with segments known as articles, its leaves reduced to tiny scales between them.

Distribution and Habitat

In New South Wales it occurs in areas such as the Clarence River valley, Emmaville, Yetman, south to Waralda, while it ranges in Queensland north to Herberton. It is found in woodland on sandstone, ironstone or laterite ridges. Associated species include grasstrees (*Xanthorrhoea*) and eucalypts, such as drooping ironbark (*Eucalyptus caleyi*).

Northwest of Glen Innes it is found in tall scrub on granitic soil uplands with other dominant species such as the she-oak species *Allocasuarina brachystachya*, wattle species *Acacia williamsiana* and the endangered Severn River heath-myrtle (*Micromyrtus*

grandis) and understory shrubs such as *Leucopogon neo-anglicus* and fringe myrtle (*Calytrix tetragona*).

It has been recorded as a host plant for the orange mistletoe (*Dendrophthoe glabrescens*).

Cultivation

Its shaggy bark gives the species its horticultural potential. It is frost hardy and able to tolerate poor soils.

Vern Bunn on his "Turning Timber into Toothpicks" web site observes that "Hairy Oak is fairly hard but turns satisfactorily and I find the medullary material quite brittle, although this might be because the pieces I have turned have been through a bushfire. It sands well and takes a high polish."


